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
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INTRODUCING THE BAY OF PLENTY

Nau mai haere mai ki Te Moananui ā Toi! Welcome to the Coastal Bay of Plenty.

This is a place where visitors can pull up a beach chair, dig their toes into the sand, and chill.

Nestled on the east coast of New Zealand's North Island, this region is home to idyllic, friendly towns and cities spread along 125km of pristine white sand beaches.

Kayaking across a lake to see a canyon shining with glow worms, hiking through more than 56,000ha of native forest or swimming with dolphins and see majestic orca are among the activities on offer here. Visitors can even hop on board a boat and visit one of our two marine reserves or one of our 24 coastal islands where they'll enjoy some of the world's most spectacular scenery!

Our place is steeped in history. Our shores are the landing place of the Mātaatua waka, one of the founding canoes that first brought Māori to New Zealand almost 1,000 years ago from Hawaiki.

Hundreds of years later, English explorer Captain James Cook named the region the 'Bay of Plenty' after noticing abundant food supplies in local Māori villages. The Bay continues to live up to that name with the warm climate making for perfect growing conditions - producing the world's best kiwifruit, avocados, citrus and Mānuka honey.

We warmly invite people to discover the stories, magic and energy of our special place. They will leave feeling invigorated with lasting memories of our stunning natural landscapes and the warmth of our climate and our people.

CLAIMS TO FAME:

New Zealand's best beaches: Ōhope Beach and Otarawairere Bay recently took top honours in the NZ Herald's best beach awards, and Mount Maunganui's Main Beach is always highly rated by locals and visitors alike.


Ancient forests: Whirinaki Te Pua-a-Tāne Conservation Park stretches over 55.000 hectares and was called "one of the great forests of the world" by acclaimed British botanist David Bellamy.

Horticultural provenance: Our region produces world-class kiwifruit, avocados, berries and more, and is renowned for its natural abundance, fertile soils and plentiful produce.

The Kiwi Capital of the World™: Whakatāne's spectacular conservation efforts have seen the population of kiwi soar. No other town has the elusive native bird living in such close proximity to people.

New Zealand's most beautiful town: In 2021 Whakatāne was selected as the supreme winner, outshining all of the nation's other towns and cities, at the Keep New Zealand Beautiful Awards. This riverside town impressed the judges with its focus on biodiversity and its efforts to reduce waste and support sustainable tourism.

Incredible natural scenery: McLaren Falls is home to one of the best botanical tree collections in New Zealand. The area also boasts the most densely populated collection of glow worms in the country.





Located in the Central North Island of New Zealand, the Bay of Plenty is effortlessly connected to the rest of the country.

Our region is an easy three hour drive from Auckland, 1 hour 30 minutes from Hamilton and 55 minutes from Rotorua. Tauranga Airport is serviced daily by Air New Zealand, with direct flights from Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch. The thriving Port of Tauranga has traditionally been the largest cruise tour destination port in New Zealand.


CLIMATE

The weather and food provenance leaves the people of the Bay of Plenty warm, relaxed and happy. You are sure to find yourself welcomed by both our sunshine and our tangata whenua (people of the land).



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CELEBRATE OUR CUISINE

The Coastal Bay of Plenty's rich volcanic soils, horticultural provenance, and abundant marine life means it consistently produces some of the freshest and finest flavours in Aotearoa. This region is also renowned for its warm hospitality which is often closely tied to food and special celebrations. From the time of kūmara, rīwai and kamokamo to kiwifruit, avocados and berries, our fruitful history has given the Bay a rightfully-earned reputation for natural abundance and plentiful produce.

To fully embrace our horticultural provenance, Tourism Bay of Plenty initiated Flavours of Plenty, a not-for-profit collective. The aim is to connect and collaborate with the food community of Te Moananui ā Toi | The Coastal Bay of Plenty and to help celebrate and elevate what we've got to offer as a food region.

Today, we're pushing the plate with truffle farms, new colours of kiwifruit, a diverse dining scene, night markets, farmers' markets and pop-up restaurants. Paired with our deep cultural foundation of manaakitangata (to provide and care for people), we are committed to creating unforgettable, world-class culinary experiences that weave a powerful connection from our place to your plate.

SUSTAINABILITY AND REGENERATION

Our region's breathtaking beauty is, without a doubt, the number one reason why people love spending time here. But beauty is fragile, and we all have a shared responsibility to look after our natural environment and the communities who call this place home.

As a Destination Management Organisation (DMO), Tourism Bay of Plenty has an inherent responsibility to walk the talk as we support and pursue sustainable and regenerative environmental strategies across our coastal region.

We encourage visitors to minimise their carbon footprint by promoting sustainable travel options, ecofriendly activities and accommodation, and supporting operators who are committed to sustainability.

The Green Room

In May 2022, Tourism Bay of Plenty launched an initiative to encourage the visitor sector to work towards a zero carbon and regenerative future. This 12-week programme, called The Green Room | Te Ruma Kakariki, is free of charge for participants thanks to the support from funding partner Bay of Plenty Regional Council Toi Moana.

Some of the actions taken by programme participants so far include switching to eco-friendly products, investing in living wage accreditation processes, planning waste-free public events, and using old refrigerators to create a fish smoker at a holiday park.



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TRADE READY PRODUCT

Tourism operators leading the way in sustainability

If you're looking for eco-tours, pristine natural areas and off-the-grid accommodation, Te Moananui ā Toi (the Coastal Bay of Plenty) has it all. Here are some tourism operators leading the way in sustainability. These operators give back to the greater cause in all sorts of ways and offer travel experiences that create a connection to the region that stays with the visitor long after they've returned home.

Travel Ed

Les Millard from Travel Ed offers guided day trips around the Bay of Plenty. His storytelling comes from a Te Ao Māori perspective, and he shares many local stories about pre-European settlement times. His experiences enable visitors to engage with the local taiao (environment) and tangata whenua (local people).

Mauao Adventures

Mauao Adventures provide guided walking tours, stand up paddle boarding, and waka ama (outrigger canoe) experiences. On the guided walk around Mauao (Mount Maunganui), the significance of the maunga (mountain) to local iwi is shared through stories. Visitors will also learn more about current environmental efforts to keep Mauao and the surrounding ocean waters pristine.

Moutohorā Island Sanctuary

Moutohorā Island (Whale Island) is one of New Zealand's most protective wildlife sanctuaries. Accessible via guided tour only, permission is granted for only a handful of visitors every day. See seals and penguins along the shoreline, listen to the call of rare native birds, spot tuatara and gecko and finish the tour with a visit to Onepū (Sulphur Bay) where you can dig your own geothermal hot pool on the beach. Ticket price includes a landing fee which supports the Department of Conservation's work on the island and a contribution to support the Whakatāne Coastguard.

Waimarino Kayak Tours

Discover tranquil Lake McLaren on a guided kayak tour with Waimarino. Enjoy a peaceful daytime tour rich with birdlife and local stories, or experience the wonder of a night-time glow worm kayak adventure. The team at Waimarino are passionate about clean, renewable energy – so passionate they've set up the Waimarino Education Trust to help educate the next generation. Kids participate in growing their own veggies, recycling and learning about solar energy.



ADVENTURE HELICOPTERS (TAURANGA)

Discover some of the best views in the coastal Bay of Plenty on a scenic helicopter flight. Enjoy a short scenic tour along our beautiful coastline or take a longer adventure for stunning views over the Pacific Ocean and the pristine native bush of the Kaimāī mountain range. 
